KD is moving from just under 6,000 square feet of space at 60 Broad Street to a full floor at 40 Exchange Place which is 14,800 square feet. Newmark Holdings and Northwind Group, the building's owners, are renovating the space which will include advanced technology and green initiatives, including offices for approximately 35 resident attorneys, offices for visiting attorneys, three conference rooms and a video conference system. The entire building is undergoing a major renovation, including a new lobby and common areas.
